Foreword

We are already at the end of term two, half way through the year. While we are heading into winter we are full of excitement as the new building is now completed. We are also coming up to our 3-yearly cycle of Board elections - we will farewell some of our longstanding members and hope some of you will join us to continue the work of supporting our school community.

Board meeting highlights

This term the Board approved funding for the first stage of the bank redevelopment - the treetop walkway. We also approved the updated school logo and agreed to move forward with consulting our community on a change to cohort entry from next year. 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Powhiri for the new build

It's exciting that we're about to move into the new school build. We have waited for this for a while and it's been great to see the building be created.

A powhiri will be held on 25 July at 8.55am. The powhiri will commence down on the field and start with a hikoi up to the new build. It will then be followed with a few speeches, the building will be blessed, and our tamariki will share waiata with us. The powhiri will be followed by a shared kai.

We look forward to seeing some of you there.

Cohort entry consultation

Traditionally in New Zealand tamariki start school on their fifth birthday, although by law they do not have to start until their sixth birthday. Since 2020 schools have been able to adopt a 'Cohort Entry' policy. More and more schools have changed to children starting school in scheduled cohorts eight times per year. A recent Education Review Office report highlighted a number of benefits for tamariki and teachers. Cohort entry allows the school to better structure the transition and allows for less disruption in the classroom. Evidence supports that tamariki who have joined as a part of a cohort have greater opportunities to develop friendships with the peers of their cohort.

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Moving to a cohort entry will mean that children will start school on specific dates. There are two starting dates per term, one at the beginning of the term and another in the middle. These dates are set by the Ministry of Education.

We will be consulting with our school community in Term 3 on this proposal.

This will add to the school identity and will be used to further develop a sense of belonging into the community. The brief to the designer was to update our existing logo to integrate our Te Reo name. The logo has a strong visual impact and works in small and large sizes as well as alternative formats.



School rebuild update

With work completed on the main building, and the move completed, work will commence on the next phase. This will involve the removal of the temporary classrooms on the lower field, and demolition of the existing block. This should be substantially completed by the time Term 3 starts.

As a part of the demolition the existing building next to the sand pit will also be demolished in preparation for a new storage building which is weather tight.

The landscaping to the bank adjacent to the new school building is on hold, waiting for the confirmation of the delivery date for the new slides, which will be installed next to the zig zag path.

The school build has taken longer than anticipated, and it is nice to be at the end of the construction. The board extends a big thank you to Naylor Love and TBIG for the delivery of the school under challenging circumstances, with COVID lockdowns, and material and trade shortages.
